I Elias Stow First Judge
of the Court of Com. Pleas in and
for said County certify, that Saml.
Corn formerly of Hadam in the
State of Connecticut, but now of
Leyden in the said County of
Lewis aged ~~forty~~ ^{thirty} seven - being duly
sworn, deposed and says, that in the
month of July in the ^{year} 1744 he enlisted
into the army of the United States
under Capt. Osborn, in Col. Brad-
win's Regiment in the Connecticut
line - Then South now of Hadam
served with him - that he served prin-
cipally in N. Jersey, but that he worked
on the chain across the river at West
Point some months - That previous
to his enlistment, ~~as~~ ^{as} above stated,
he was in the Battle of Bunker Hill,
and also in that of the White Plains;
that he has lost his discharge - that
he was honourably discharged in

December ~~1779~~ in the year 1779 at
West Point, (Balclishin being still the
Col.) And also, that by reason of
his reduced circumstances in life,
he is in need of the assistance of
his country for support - He also
says, that Timothy Bailey of the same
regiment, served in Col. Meigs' Regiment,
& knows that he served as Matross
before

April 22nd 1818

I certify that on the 22nd April
1818. Samuel Stone made oath
to the truth of the foregoing statement
before me, Silas Stone Just Judge as aforesaid -

I Silas Stone Judge as aforesaid do further certify
that it appears to my satisfaction, that the deponent
before described, did serve in the revolution-
ary war, as he has set forth against the common
enemy - This declaration was corroborated by the
said Bailey on oath before me, I now transmit
the testimony, and the proceedings had thereon
to the Secretary of the Department of War

Silas Stone

State of New York
Lewis County. — On this Nineteenth day of September 1820 personally appeared in open Court, to wit, in the Court of Common Pleas, held at the Court House in the Town of Mattburgh, in and for the County of Lewis, the same being a Court of record in and for the said County, proceeding according to the course of the common law, with a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount, keeping a record of its proceedings, and possessing a Seal — Samuel Bone, aged sixty five years, residing in said County, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his oath declare, that he served in the Revolutionary War, as follows, during One year in Captain Abraham Tyles Company in Col. Huntingtons Regt. in the Connecticut line; Three years in Capt. Osbourns Company, in Col. Jonathan Baldwins Regiment Connecticut line, after which he served Six months in Capt. Abner Shipmans Company in Col. Elip Regt in the same line, as will also appear by his original declaration, bearing date 22^d April 1818; That he has received a Pension, and the number of his Pension Certificate is 13.119 — And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and Naval service of the United States, in the revolutionary War" passed on the 18th March 1818. — and I have not, nor has

any person in trust for me any property or securities, Contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule here annexed, and by me subscribed.

And this deponent further saith that his Occupation is farming, the pursuit of which is rendered difficult in consequence of his advanced age; that his family consists of two persons exclusive of himself, who are his wife, Betsey Cone, aged sixty three years, and his Daughter Worthy Cone, aged seventeen years —

The children of Betty Coon widow
of Samuel Coon authorized me as
their attorney to procure an increase
of their mother's pension from \$144
per annum to \$240 per annum from
the 4th March 1831 to 5th March 1849
the day of her death. The then actg.
Comd of Pensions under date of July 5, 1857
rejected the claim on the sole ground
that Samuel Coon enlisted one day prior
to the passage of the Resolution fixing the
pay of Artificers at \$20 per month to wit
on the 10th day of February 1778. While said
Resolution was passed on the 11th day
of February 1778. As Attorney for the
said Claimants I authorized & request
John T. Neely Esq to appeal from said
decision as being unjust that one
man performing similar service &
at the same time of another should be
paid a smaller sum ~~for his services~~
An engagement to serve to be complete
must also have the acceptance of the
party ~~to be served~~ by the soldiers being
incorporated into service, which acceptance
might not have been till after the
11th February 1778

On this second day of September 1836
personally appeared before me
the Subscriber J. D. Mott a Judge of the
Court of Common Pleas of said County, City and
County of Lewis in said County of Lewis and
State of New York aged twenty five years last
December who being first duly sworn according to
law doth in his oath make the following declara-
tion in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the act of Congress passed July 18th 1830: That
she is the Widow of Samuel Coan who was a
private in the Army of the Revolutionary War, and
that he served under Colonel Mays at the time
said Samuel often informed this deponent and
as this deponent believes to be true that he enlisted
into the Army in the early part of the war and served
in the Army of the Revolution until the close of
the war, that the said Samuel Coan was a pen-
sioner under the Act of 1818 and that he has
no documentary evidence of his service to the knowl-
edge of this deponent. She further declared that she
was married to the said Samuel Coan at the
age of sixteen years on the first day of March
in the year seventeen hundred and seventy eight
that her husband the aforesaid Samuel died
on the 23rd day of April 1835 and that she
has remained a widow ever since that period as
will more fully appear by reference to the proof
to be made
